






Our Mission

In a unique collaboration between Harvard students and the Cambridge community, CityStep, a Harvard undergraduate organization, combines the spirit of public service with the performing arts. CityStep enriches the educational experience of Cambridge public school fifth, sixth, and seventh grade students through a curriculum of dance and other creative activities. By introducing students to the performing arts as a medium for self-expression, an outlet for creativity, and as a means to enhance self-confidence and a sense of community, CityStep gives the Cambridge students a meaningful educational experience.



CityStep seeks to:

- Channel the spirit of urban life and the energy of middle school students into creative forms of selfexpression.
- Promote the values of hard work, dedication, and cooperation through the performing and visual arts.
- Unite a demographically diverse population of public school students with a diverse group of Harvard undergraduates.
- Foster self-respect and self-confidence in local middle school students by helping them realize a tangible goal – the annual CityStep Show
- Create a positive and unique experience for Harvard undergraduates that integrates service and the arts.
- Forge closer bonds between Harvard College and the surrounding community by uniting undergraduates with Cambridge students in meaningful mentoring relationships.



Uniting Harvard and Cambridge Communities

This year, CityStep at Harvard partnered with the Amigos School, Fletcher-Maynard Academy, and Kennedy-Longfellow School, conducting both in-school and after-school programs for grades 5-7.

Building Creativity and Self-Confidence

When asked about their favorite aspect of CityStep in the end-of-year survey, CityStep kids responded:

- "Being able to show my creativity and express myself." –Serena,
 3YP
- "Performing. Showing how hard we worked." –Student from Amigos 2YP

Sarah Collazo, a fifth grade teacher at the Amigos School, said that CityStep has helped her students increase their self-confidence:

 "It tends to be that by the end of the year the student that you're most concerned with is up there [on stage] and doing everything...They really kind of come into their own and I think that that's been one of the most rewarding experiences for me as a teacher, seeing that for my students."

90% of CityStep students in 3YP reported feeling confident about creating their own dances. While all three CityStep programs promote creative expression, the CityStep curriculum particularly emphasizes choreography in the Third-Year Program, and the 3YP piece in the spring showcase is entirely choreographed by the students.

Promoting Mutual Understanding

Through CityStep, undergraduates have been able to form mentoring relationships with Cambridge middle school students. In Kennedy-Longfellow 1YP, every student indicated that they strongly agreed with the statement, "My CityStep teachers make me feel like they really care about me." All the classes combined responded with an average rating of 8.75 out of 10, with 10 being strongly agree.

- 93% of company members said that CityStep enabled them to form relationships with Cambridge public school students.
- "I count all of the kids I have taught (almost 60) as friends. I have many on Facebook and they continue to talk to me, ask me about college

life and for advice." –CityStep teacher for two years

 "One girl told me I was like a sister to her and others have just been so loving." –Jana Christian '12, Executive Director

CityStep also helps promote mutual understanding amongst students.

"Sometimes I see relationships forming with kids that aren't usually connected socially in school...I feel like when they have that one common shared experience, it opens the door for new friendships to form." –Sarah Collazo, 5th Grade Teacher at the Amigos School
