The History of CityStep

CityStep began in 1983 when founding director Sabrina Peck led a small group of Harvard students into Cambridge Public Schools to teach the students dance and theater. Today CityStep involves over 150 members of the Harvard-Radcliffe community and 120 Cambridge fifth and sixth graders. Such growth is a testament to the success of CityStep's innovative program which combines the spirit of public service with the creativity of the arts.

Throughout the school year, Harvard-Radcliffe undergraduate teaching teams work with the CitySteppers helping the kids to express themselves through movement. The program emphasizes the importance of trust, teamwork, and self-confidence through an introduction to the performing arts. CityStep's school year culminates in this completely original production.

In addition to its regular program, CityStep has given special performances at the Cambridge River Festival, Harvard's Arts First, Harvard's 350th Aniversary Celebration, and Jazz Life. For the past twelve years, the Mayor of Cambridge has declared a city-wide day to honor CityStep's work. Now in our thirteenth year, we look with excitement and awe at the organization's remarkable history and hope it will live on in years to come.

In-School Program

Two mornings each week, CityStep teams of Harvard-Radcliffe undergrads teach dance to fifth graders in the Longfellow, King Open, and Graham and Parks Alternative Schools in Cambridge. The undergraduates work with the public school teachers to integrate the CityStep program into the students' regular school curriculum.

In CityStep class, the students and undergraduate teachers collaborate on exercises and choreography geared toward developing self-confidence, determination, and teamwork. This is accomplished in the first half of the year through learning the building blocks of dance. In the second half of the year, the mastered concepts and techniques are put to use, as the creativity of CitySteppers and teachers are integrated into the choreography of the scenes you'll see in Pump Up



Kitt's Thoughts:

At our all-day rehearsal, where all of the CityStep classes rehearse together, my kids watched the secondyear AfterSchool classes dance. Inspired by seeing what could be done with more practice and experience, they immediately started working on our dance, perfecting it and adding their own spice to the moves. Some of my kids, though, were worried that they would never look as good as the After-School kids. Then I told them that I had taught these AfterSchool dancers last year just as I am teaching them now. They nodded, watched some more, and then started perfecting and spicing up their part of the dance, too. What more can I say? I love these kids.

After-School Program

The After-School Program is an optional second-year program for students who participated in an In-School class the previous year. After-Schoolers build on skills already acquired, and focus on more intensive dancing and group work. This year's classes are made up of CitySteppers from Longfellow, Tobin, Peabody, Agassiz, and Cambridgeport Schools. Transported to the Harvard campus by the Youth Activity Coordinators, the After-School classes meet twice weekly.

The CityStep day usually begins with an opening circle during which we discuss the goals for the day and the week. A CityStepper then leads the group in a warm-up exercise, and the activities and dancing begin. Throughout the year, a dance routine is developed, and in each class the CitySteppers learn one more "add-on" to create the total piece. At the end of every class the whole group joins hands for the CityStep bow.

The goals of the After-School program are varied and important for both the undergrads and City-Steppers. From dance skills to group cooperation, activities are geared toward teaching different means of expression and communication as well as toward enhancing self-confidence in all the students. Though each of us comes from different schools and backgrounds, we have spent an intense and exciting year learning to work together in creative ways.

They spend a lot of time getting to know the CitySteppers.

CityStep classes help the kids learn what it's like to be part of a team and work together towards a common goal. The YACs are a key part of this mission. We've had an amazing YAC team this year. Thanks for all your enthusiasm and dedication!

The Music

Books, books, books. Westerns, history, fairy tales, mystery — I never got to read those kind of books at Harvard. Somehow "An Introduction to Algorithms" is lacking something on the adrenaline side. It's probably just as well that my suggestion to use "Telephone" for one of the pieces was discarded early on in the selection process.

"Welcome to CityStep. This is the only message you will hear."

Each of the CityStep composers is part of a team that makes each piece of the show come to life. Somewhere between the flashy choreography and the pumping rhythms, CityStep happens. You won't realize it at first. It kind of creeps up on you and suddenly your foot is tapping and your eyes are dazzled and you wish the show hadn't ended so soon.

So how does a piece get written? You start with an idea. You plot things out, think things through, and then throw all that out and write from the heart. CityStep is about communication and no one ever expressed love or excitement or humor in a form letter. Every piece is unique and every beat is the voice of a musician telling a story.

So sit back and settle in for one of the greatest adventures ever told. Let yourself get lost in our library where you can check out spine-tingling tales, stories of knights and squires and pages, and epic adventures from North to South, East to West, and, of course, cover to cover.


