THE HISTORY OF CITY/STEP



CityStep began in 1983 when Sabrina Peck started a dance group to provide a place for undergraduates to express themselves through motion. The first CityStep show was performed that year in Boston. At one of these shows Sabrina Peck and her undergraduate troupe did some work with children, motivating and inspiring them to explore dance. The success of this short workshop inspired Ms. Peck to set up a permanent program in conjunction with the Cambridge Public Schools to work with children.

From these beginnings CityStep has established itself as one of the most innovative public service programs in the country. Ours is a unique curriculum that combines dance, games, and other art forms to foster self-expression, self-confidence, and teamwork in the CitySteppers. Throughout their year long relationship with their teachers and directors the CitySteppers get a chance to explore themselves through motion and benefit from interacting with some incredibly talented and enthusiastic undergraduates.

The focal point of the CityStep curriculum, however, has always been the final show. This event showcases a year of work on the part of the CitySteppers and undergraduates and brings the CityStep program to an exciting and satisfying conclusion. In the first few years of the program the show was held in December, usually on makeshift stages such as in the Malkin Athletic Complex basketball courts. The show has since expanded to become the creative and visually exciting event you will see today.

Since its inception CityStep has constantly evolved. Now looking towards its 15th anniversary, CityStep continues to build on its strong foundation as it reaches for new horizins. Our growth as an organization is a testament to the success of our innovative curriculum and program.

IIN~School PROGRAM

Two mornings each week four dedicated teams of Harvard undergraduates teach dance to Cambridge public school fifth- and sixth-graders. This year the Tobin, Kennedy, Morse, and Peabody schools have all integrated CityStep into their curriculum. During the first half of the year, In-School CitySteppers learn the basics of dance and develop skills such as teamwork and self-confidence. During their December mini-performance, they get a taste of being onstage while performing for other elementary school classes. After winter break the CityStep kids and teachers build on the skills learned in the fall to create an original dance piece. AFTER-SCHOOL PROGRAM

The After-School Program is an optional second-year program for students who would like to continue citystep after their year in the In-School Program. After-school classes meet twice a week for twice as long as the In-School Program. Students build on skills already acquired and focus on more intensive dancing and group work. This year's After-School class is composed of students from Graham and Parks Alternative, King Open, and Longfellow schools.

The CityStep day usually begins with an opening circle during which we discuss the goals for the day and the week. then the activities and the dancing begin. The dance piece which is performed during the Show was begun in October, and at each day's class students learn additional "add-on 8 counts" towards creating the final piece. at the end of every class, the whole class joins hands for the CityStep bow.

The goals of the After-School program are varied and important for both CitySteppers and undergraduate teachers alike. From dance skills to group cooperation, activities are geared toward teaching different



means of expression and communication as well as toward enhancing self-confidence in all the students. The additional time which After-School requires gives the undergraduate teaching team a





Throughout our 14-year history CityStep has used the emblem of the red high-top sneakers as its hallmark, placing it on posters, clothing, and even the company letter-head. With this year's Show, we take the idea to a new level. This year's theme is shoes... the missing CityStep shoes... and the CitySteppers' search to find them. Arriving at this theme, designing, and putting a show togehter around it has been challenging, fun, exhausting, and occasionally frustrating, but NEVER boring. The performance you see today comes from the ideas and hard work of an enthusiastic design team, dedicated teachers, and of course, the stars of CityStep, the KIDS!

As the Show Producers, we have been able to watch "You Gotta Have Sole: A CityStep Mystery" grow from a hazy idea into the exciting performance about to get under way. In addition to those whose work you'll see displayed onstage, there are countless other individuals who have devoted an extraordinary amount of time and effort to this project. Even if you don't get the chance to see the people who work behind the scenes, remember, your applause means as much to them as to the dancers in the front row.

Each Show presents new challenges and necessitates creative approaches, but this year really puts the CitySteppers to the test. Not only are they putting on a spectacular dance performance, but they are also solving the mystery of the missing CityStep shoes. The CitySteppers are good, but can they tackle both challenges at once? Have a seat, catch your breath, and prepare to find out.

Zak's Thoughts: Producing the CityStep Show is an incredibly demanding process. It takes eight months of preparation to create a performance that lasts a little over an hour. But what an hour it is! This is my third year being involved with CityStep and my second year producing the Show, and I continue to be amazed by the unmatched talent and enthusiasm of those who take part in this production.

Over the past three years, CityStep has accounted for about one third of my all-nighters and better than half of my missed classes, but it has also accounted for close to two thirds of my friendships and at least five thousand of my smiles. CityStep won't take no for an answer. The kids are never too tired, the teachers never too busy, the directors never too stressed, the tech-crew never too sleep-deprived to practice a little longer, explore a little further, or push themselves a little harder to improve. This is a unique group, deeply committed, tightly knit, and remarkably caring and friendly.

CityStep has contributed greatly to my experience at Harvard. It is my escape from the Ivory Tower and my chance to be a part of something meaningful and magical. Glaciers melt, continents drift, and mountains crumble, but CityStep keeps on dancing!

Jamie's Thoughts: When Zak convinced me to join him as Co-Show Producer my freshman year, I had no idea what I was getting myself into. Now, two years later, I realize that I was committing myself to one of the best experiences of my life, one without which I would be a very different person. Producing the CityStep show involves dealing with people of all personalities and tempers, finding moonsuits and umbrellas without blowing our entire budget, guiding the directors and designers towards a unified show in which the CityStep kids can strut their stuff and not fall off the stage, and in general thinking of everything ahead of time (and then dealing with it when we forget something). It's been a terrific experience, at times demanding but undeniably rewarding, and I wouldn't trade it for anything. Zak, these two years have been wonderful, we make quite a team (and we have incredible timing at rescuing each other). Thank you so much for your friendship and your smiles, and the ability to yell louder than me. And a hearty thank-you to everyone else, without whom CityStep would be less than what it is. This is truly an amazing program.

"The computer doesn't work."


"The computer ate my piece."

BEHIND THE SCENES: THE PRODUCERS


This year's Producer Board first met in May, 1996. Since that first meeting the producers dedicated themselves to completing all the administrative and organizational tasks necessary for a successful CityStep production.

Each producer handles one aspect of CityStep. The Class Producer, Sarah Lohrius, handles the logistics and administration of the After-School and In-School program. With the help of the Assistant Class Producer, Lisa Mignone, the Class Producer is responsible for communication with the parents and school administrators of CitySteppers. 




