HISTORY OF CITYSTEP



CityStep began in 1983 when Sabrina Peck started a dance group to provided a place for undergraduates to express themselves through motion. The first CityStep show was performed that year in Boston. At one of these shows Sabrina Peck and her undergraduate troupe did some work with children, motivating and inspiring them to explore dance. The success of the short workshop inspired by Ms. Peck to set up a permanent program in conjunction with the Cambridge Public Schools to work with children.

From these beginnings, CityStep has established itself as one of the most innovative public service programs in the country. Ours is a unique curriculum that combines dance, games, and other art forms to foster self-expression, self-confidence, and teamwork in the CitySteppers. Throughout their yearlong relationship with their teachers and directors, the CitySteppers get a chance to explore themselves through motion and benefit from interacting with some incredibly talented and enthusiastic undergraduates.

The focal point of the CityStep curriculum, however, has been the final show. This event showcases a year of work on the part of the CitySteppers and undergraduates and brings the CityStep program to an exciting and satisfying conclusion. In the first few years of the program the show was held in December, usually on makeshift stages such as in the Malkin Athletic Complex basketball courts. The show has since expanded to become the creative and visually exciting event you will see today.

Since its inception, CityStep has constantly evolved. Now looking towards its 19th anniversary, CityStep continues to build on its strong foundation as it reaches for new horizons. Our growth as an organization is a testament of the success of our innovative curriculum and program.

Angela's Thoughts

Someone once told me that the best way to make a difference is to teach kids. That and a love of dance are what brought me to CityStep two years ago. Since then, I've realized that although CityStep is about the kids, it's also about our teachers who devote countless hours of their time and energy to the kids. It's about developing self-confidence, creativity, individuality and teamwork. Most importantly, it's about taking risks to go beyond what is familiar.

Two mornings each week four dedicated teams of Harvard undergraduates teach dance to Cambridge public school fifth- and sixth-graders. This year Fletcher-Maynard, Kennedy, and Morse schools have all integrated CityStep into their curriculum. During the first half of the year, In-School Citysteppers learn the basics of dance and develop skills such as teamwork and selfconfidence. During their December mini-performance, they got a taste of being onstage while performing for other elementary school classes. After winter break the CityStep kids and teachers build on skills learned in teh fall to create a n original dance piece, The show you'll see today is the culmination of all of our efforts throughout the year. We hope you enjoy it!

This year, all of our teachers have challenged themselves to push past their own limits, both in the classroom and in the dance studio. Aaron, Stella, James, Kimika, Dan, and Sarah have been true role models for Ms. Dana Brown's fifth grade class. You guys have brought energy and innovation to the kids and to our choreography, and you've managed to keep things fun and entertaining along the way. 



Act I

Sculpture

Fletcher-Maynard Director: Joel Pollack As the CitySteppers enter the sculpture wing, they are amazed at how lifelike the statues are. Most of the art they've seen is two dimensional, but these pieces look as though they could come alive at any moment. Where have they come from? What would they say? How would they move? Watch as the students explore the stories behind these masterpieces

Afterschool Director: Sarah Cohen

MC ESHER CitySteppers enter a room of MC Esher drawings and the artwork quickly intrigues the students with its geometric shapes and optical illusions. Motivated by MC Esher's work, the students try to recreate the artist's style through dance. Particularly attracted to Esher's Drawing Hands and House of Stairs, small groups of CitySteppers decide to use motion to recreate these drawings.

Architecture As we walk into and out of buildings each day, going about our business, not too many of us see the structures around us as art. However, after a close examination of its interior and exterior, the CityStep teachers decide that the museum itself is just as much a masterpiece as the works of art it holds. Travel with them as they discover the inspirations behind the creation of some of the world's greatest architecture.

Painting

Kennedy Director: Jason D. Williams

The Gallery of the CityStep Museum is being closed for a routine security sweep. Once the guard leaves the hall though, things are anything but normal! Characters from Rene Magritte's Golconde, Diego Rivera's Night of the Rich, and Vincent van Gogh's Starry Night jump out of the canvas and show us that the language of dance transcends both time and culture. In the end, the three groups form one painting—Georges Seurat's A Sunday on La Grande Jatte—to keep their secret from the befuddled security guard.

Act II

Photography

Morse Director: Valerie Charat As the kids continue on their exploration, they wander into the photography exhibit of the CityStep museum. Here both the audience and CitySteppers learn about the art of picture taking. The first lesson is on the process of film development. Experience firsthand the way an image is exposed onto film, processed onto paper, and hung up to dry. Walking through the wing, the CitySteppers' next lesson explores different photographic genres, ranging from the black and white pictures of the 1940's to sports photography; and from a collection on portrait photography to one on nature. Don't be surprised as the pictures come alive, jumping out of their frames to dance in the museum. In the end the CitySteppers themselves become part of

A Cinematic Journey

Fletcher-Maynard Director: Angela Y. Lin Excited about all their adventures so far, the kids move on to the next CityStep Museum exhibit about the art of making film. Instead of being an audience, however, they walk right into the midst of movie history where they go on set and learn about the wide variety of movements, styles, moods, and sounds that characterize different genres of film. They journey through the era of silent film and Charlie Chaplin to that of poker-playing film noir, then to the 80's with its Footloose-style dance extravaganzas, and finally to the modern era of Matrix-like special effects. Join them as they discover that *magic* lies as much in the watching as in the making of a film.

Masks

Teacher Optional

After a long day at the CityStep museum the teachers wander into the anthropology wing only to discover a fantastical display of African masks. These artifacts come to life in a rush of movement and color, and soon those with masks and those without are swinging and stomping to a unifying beat.

Graffitti

Afterschool Director: Sarah Cohen After leaving the museum, the after-school CitySteppers decide to relax by playing basketball, jump rope, and step. Soon the group decides to stomp and breakdance their way back into the museum to explore the visiting graffiti exhibition. On their way to the exhibition they encounter a sophisticated French painter who arrogantly claims that graffiti art isn't "real" art. The CitySteppers decide to show the painter how artistic graffiti can be. Impressed, the painter acknowledges graffiti as a true art form and – unable to resist – joins the CitySteppers as they try their hand at their own graffiti.

FINALE



The Tuesday-Thursday Afterschool Program is an optional second year program for students who wish to continue CityStep after their first year in the In-School Program. After-school meets twice a week for as long as the In-School Program. Students build on skills already acquired and focus on more intensive dancing and group work. This year, our program is composed of students from Harrington, Longfellow, Kennedy, Peabody, and Graham & Parks. The goals of the Afterschool Program range from dance skills to group cooperation, with all activities geared toward teaching different means of expression and communication as well as toward enhancing self-confidence in all students. The additional time which Afterschool requires gives the undergraduate teaching team a chance to develop an exceptionally strong rapport with the CitySteppers on a group and individual basis.


Duisha's Thoughts
